Chief Executive's Report

1 Establishment Unit / NZIST Transition Update

1.1 ITP Council Chairs and CEs Hui – 5 December 2019

The ITP Council Chairs and CEs hui on 5 December 2019 at Ara's Manawa campus was the first combined meeting since the RoVE announcement at Parliament in February 2019.

Main hui business included updates on work undertaken and in progress from the Establishment Unit and other agencies – NZQA, TEC and MoE.

a Establishment Unit

- i Development of 10 workstreams and the Mobilising the New World activity including:
 - Learner journey map
 - Employer and community engagement
 - Education products and services
 - Work-based learning development
 - New academic architecture
 - Online arrangements

Facilities Management Sustainability Initiatives

Please find below list of Facilities Management Sustainability Initiatives

Energy

- Solar Panels
 - o More than 440Mwh of energy produced since installed in August 2017, at 20c/kWh this energy equivalent to \$88,000 and save 75 tons of carbon emission.
- Biodiesel
 - o B20 Biodiesel boiler blend is used (i.e. 20% part of the diesel is renewable and lets off fewer emissions)
- Timaru boiler switched to use wood pellets instead of coal
- Purchasing Electricity from Meridian Energy, which generates power from 100% renewable energy sources.
- Regular Maintenance and Upgrades
 - o Jazz Block air conditioning
 - o ALX Block chiller
 - o Trades new LPG boiler
 - o Ongoing replacement of old fluorescent tube lights with new and efficient LED lights
- Energy Management and optimisation via BMS that measure, monitor and control energy usage at HVAC, boilers, heat pumps and chillers
 - o For 2018, the floor area of Madras Street Campus was increased from 61,023 m² to 70,4091 m² but it's energy usage per square meter (\$/m²) decreased from \$30.46/m² to \$24.68/m². This translates to a saving of \$407,928.74.

Other potential initiatives

- CEMARS certificate
- Looking for options to integrate timetabling/room booking system with the BMS to further improve usage to air conditioning and heating usage in classrooms and staff areas.

Capital Works Programme

- Sustainability is planned into all CWP projects. Sustainability is treated as a stakeholder during project planning and delivery.
- DL lecture theatre refurbishment has sustainable practices at its heart. All seating and frames are being refurbished and re-upholstered rather than replaced with new items. This gives both financial and environmental benefits. Electrical usage will be greatly reduced by the new Daiken air conditioning system (connected to our BMS) and all lights being replaced with LEDs. All the gas from the decommissioned air conditioning system was recovered.

Capital Works Programme (continued)

- There is also a further sustainability benefit of significantly reduced maintenance on these items.
- Sustainability is planned into all CWP projects. Sustainability is treated as a stakeholder during project planning and delivery.
- DL lecture theatre refurbishment has sustainable practices at its heart. All seating and frames are being refurbished and re-upholstered rather than replaced with new items. This gives both financial and environmental benefits. Electrical usage will be greatly reduced by the new Daiken air conditioning system (connected to our BMS) and all lights being replaced with LEDs. All the gas from the decommissioned air conditioning system was recovered. There is also a further sustainability benefit of significantly reduced maintenance on these items.
- Photovoltaic systems are evaluated for each new build project. Two different photovoltaic systems are being evaluated between Kahukura (K Block) and Te Kei (G Block). Kahukura has a 138kWp “single peak” North facing system. This is to be compared to Te Kei “twin peak” East/West facing system. Both systems are connected into the Ara Madras Campus power supply main, therefore on low usage days with K & G Buildings, excess electricity is shared to other buildings.
- C Block demo. The energy required to heat old C Block is more than the new G & K Blocks combined. The whole of C Block was consuming over \$200,000 per year in energy for heating and lighting. There will be a significant reduction in energy usage to be quantified after demo. Timber, bricks, metals wires are all separated and recycled during the demolition, with an expected 80% recovery in clean areas.
- Carpark refurbishment project. Sustainability and economic drivers combined in the delivery method for this project. Rather than remove all the old fill on site and replace with new material, this project used the Mill & Stabilize technique. A special machine grinds up the existing fill material and adds small amounts of cement as it lays the base course. Net result is less digging, significantly less material carted to and from site and a lower overall cost.

Operational

- **Waste Management**
 - Food scrap bins throughout Ara
 - Changed accommodation waste bins from 2 x 4.5 cubic meter bins to several smaller 660 litre wheelie bins to encourage better usage.
 - Upgraded the Waste and Recycling bins in high use areas from small old fashion design to a larger modern colourful design which matches bins used in other high use areas such as the Christchurch Airport. (Usage Recognition)
- **Cleaning**
 - OCS use Bio-Zyme based products. Bio-Zyme is a non-toxic, biodegradable environmentally friendly, deodorising agent, which augments biological action.
 - OCS are only using two products to keep waste to a minimum.

- **Contractors**
 - National Decorators take any unused paint back to Resene for recycling.
 - PG Painters label and store the unused paint we use for repair work so it can be used again for future work
 - Where practical our building contractors reuse material.

- **Maintenance Team**
 - Where possible we recycle materials so they can be repurposed or reused in another location e.g.:
 - Door hardware
 - Pin Boards
 - Whiteboards
 - Ceiling tiles
 - In the basement we keep a supply of doors and other building materials so they can be reused if feasible to do so.
 - Where we can scrap metal is recycled.

- **Decants**
 - We are now disposing of end of life furniture in a more sustainable way, for example an old table would have its tabletop removed and dumped, and its steel legs would be recycled as scrap metal. Cash back to Ara.
 - Any furniture of a reasonable standard now resides in the basement and can be sold to Ara staff.
 - Two Electric Vehicles have been purchased, reducing emissions, put to good use for Staff travel.
 - Vehicles now have GPS systems which help FM/Ara keep track of their usage/efficiencies, can make sure they are utilized in the best possible way. This can affect/reduce the rentals we hire as we now know the availability of each one.

Appendix 1



Timaru campus boiler - Switching to wood pellet from coal

- ▶ Timaru Campus is *mitigating about 250 tonnes of CO₂ every year* after converting its main heating system from coal to wood pellet .
- ▶ *Burning wood is clean and free from toxic heavy metal* such as lead, mercury and cadmium which are released otherwise on burning coal.
- ▶ *Reduction in green house gas emission* : Nitrogen oxide by 60% and Sulphur dioxide by 94%.
- ▶ Unlike coal, wood pellet is a *renewable source*



Boiler at Timaru Campus



Using Bio-Diesel as boiler fuel to lower emission

- ▶ *Bio-Diesel/Bio-Fuel* is a liquid which *is made from vegetable or plant-based oil*. Sometimes made from used vegetable oil from deep fryers.
- ▶ At Ara, *we use B20 Bio Boiler blend* which consist of 80% mineral diesel and 20% Bio-Diesel.
- ▶ It lets off fewer emissions, reduces release of harmful toxins and is less likely to self-combust hence safer to store.





Solar energy on campus

- ▶ **Solar Electricity** : Ara has grid tied roof top solar PVs at its Christchurch Campus
 - ▶ Total 138 KWp system at K Block and 20 KWp System at G Block
 - ▶ The system has produced more than 440 MWh since installed in 2017 year (i.e. \$88,000 @ 20c/kWh)
 - ▶ Avoided more than 75 tons of carbon emission in electricity.
- ▶ **Solar Heating** : Ara also utilise Solar Energy for domestic water heating.

Energy management to reduce campus energy usage

- ▶ Reduce energy usage across campus by :
 - ▶ **Scheduling optimisation** : Match the operation of HVAC system with building occupancy
 - ▶ **Holiday Shutdown** : Shutting down non-critical systems during holidays to save energy.
 - ▶ **Comfort band implementations**: Preventing excessive heating and cooling with dynamic uniform temperature set points that improves occupant comfort.
 - ▶ **Regular maintenance and check**: Preventive maintenance approach and regular checks on building equipment to ensure it is performing efficiently all year long.
 - ▶ **Improving Building Energy performance**: Hot water heat pump instead of boiler, efficient LED lights instead of fluorescent, Building Management System(BMS) to monitor and optimise building energy usage.
